

Projects are due in on **Friday 27th November**, so your child has plenty of time to complete it to a high standard. Please refer to the Class Dojo message sent for further information.




DROP OFF AND PICK UPS

THE DARING DEEDS OF MARY SEACOLE!




Who was Mary Seacole?

Mary Seacole was born in Jamaica 1805. Her dad went to the British army, and her mum was a nurse in Jamaica. In 1836, Mary married a man called Edwin Seacole, and became known as Mary Seacole.

Mary's Life



At a young age, Mary started to help her mum in helping many injured people. Soon afterwards, in 1853, Blundell Hall burnt down, and it was a great tragedy! Most famously,

she was known for never giving up, and saving the soldiers, but also giving warmth, shelter and providing food and water.



Why is she Remembered?

Shortly after this, she cured the soldiers, using many herbal remedies, and at the time, she was known as Mother Seacole. Post war, she was awarded a medal of bravery, and a statue was erected of her! 😊
