



Everything I know about the Gauls

What I know about the Gauls

The Gauls were a hated enemy of the Romans and are one of the tribes of a large group called the Celts. They originated from modern- day France, Belgium, Luxembourg, most of Switzerland and some parts of Northern Italy. They were recognized as long-haired fellows with trousers and were said to be brave and fierce warriors by the Romans, they said that to convince people that they were beating up strong warriors. The Romans thought of the Gauls as 'barbarians.' However, the Gauls were just as civilized, for they were master blacksmiths and weaponsmiths, considered to be better than the Romans.

There were many tribes in the Celts, but they're a lot similar. Sharing the same culture, clothes and art. Speaking of art, <u>Gaulish</u> and Celtic art was characterized by repeating patterns and abstract elements, including geometric and curvilinear patterns. It was not based on realism and they were keen on drawing fictional animals, exaggerating the features.

The Book of Kells is an illuminated manuscript of the four gospels of the Christian New Testament, currently housed at Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland. It is full of bible scriptures and spiritual creatures that represent the four evangelists; a man for Matthew, a lion of Mark, a calf for Luke, and an eagle for John.

Celtic and <u>Gaulish</u> women were very different from women in Rome. They were a lot less restricted and were allowed to join the army. Roman women could not choose to be divorced and were their father's property before marrying: then they belong to their husband. Celt females were quite the opposite. Roman aw stated that women could not be leading Rome. Due to <u>Gaulish</u> law, strong queens such as Queen Boudicca and Cartimandua who lead their armies to fight the best they could.
