What are SATs?

Standard Assessment Tests (SATs) are Government tests taken by children at the end of Years 2 and 6.



How are the children prepared?

- Conferencing
- □ Target setting
- Effective support from home
- Period of revision
- □ Individual study
- Computers (online resources, where available)
- Small focused groups
- Booster groups

What is assessed?

English – Reading, Spelling, Grammar and Writing (which is teacher assessed)

Maths – all areas. Calculators are no longer allowed.



English

Reading – 1 hour to read a booklet that includes 3 different types of text and then answer questions relating to the texts.

Grammar (45 minutes)
Spelling (10 minutes) Around 15 minutes
(not strictly timed). Pupils listen to 20
target words within 20 separate
sentences.



English

There will be a selection of question types, including:

Ranking/ordering

Labelling

Find and copy

Short constructed response

Open-ended response



SATs packs

- □ The school will provide a pack to help your child with their revision. It is expected that they spend some time each day revising.
- □ A timetable of what and when to do their work will be given out along with the SATs pack in the New Year.



During SATs' week ...

- ☐ If a child is ill or cannot attend school during SATs week then the school has to be notified immediately so that we can make alternative arrangements for the child or seek advice from the LA.
- No holidays will be authorised and any absences will need to be fully investigated

Scaled scores

- A pupil's scaled score is based on their raw score. The raw score is the total number of marks a pupil receives in a test, based on the number of questions they answer correctly. The pupil's raw score is translated into a scaled score using a conversion table.
- ☐ A scaled score of 100 will always represent the expected standard on the KS2 test.
- Scaled scores help test results to be reported consistently from one year to the next so that 2 pupils achieving the same scaled score in different years will have demonstrated a similar level of attainment.





HOW PARENTS CAN HELP?

Help with learning spellings – looking for patterns and rules.

Encourage your child to read (at least 30mins a day – 4/5 times a week)

Ensure good attendance at school.

Support them with their home learning and working through the SATs books.



Administering the Tests

Special arrangements: children with special needs (additional time, readers, translators, etc) may be able to receive this support.

Transcription is allowed for exceptional cases.



The week of the exams...

- □ A breakfast club will be provided for those Year 6 children who would like to attend. Those that don't attend need to have a good breakfast and arrive at school on time, after a good night's sleep.
- Children to bring a light snack and a bottle of water or other non-fizzy drink to have at break time.
