  community infant school next-door. We are Ofsted rated 'good', but we are so much more than that!


## **Our Mission Statement**

• St Michael at Bowes is a Church of England school, reflecting and building from Christian values.


- We believe that every child should have a happy, safe, secure and disciplined environment in order that all children may thrive and reach their full potential.

## **The Curriculum**

At St Michael at Bowes, we have constructed a rigorous, knowledge-rich curriculum that reflects the wonderful diversity of our community and the opportunities offered to us by the area we live in. Topics are organised in the best way to allow pupils to build on their previous learning, make progress and thrive in their study of the subject. Children build on firm foundations by studying topics that build on each other or follow a sequence. Each topic reinforces prior learning and widens as children move through the school, revisiting concepts in greater depth.

Our inclusive curriculum is based on the belief that every child should be provided with an equal opportunity to take ownership of and become masters of their own learning. We want children to use their learning as inspiration for their own creative journeys; for them to enjoy their learning, develop enquiring minds, gain essential knowledge and develop the personal qualities they need to be good citizens of the world.

At SMAB, we strive to give our children the best start in life by establishing secure foundations in reading. Reading is at the heart of our curriculum. We want every child to be passionate about reading, be hungry to read broadly and often, and have the desire to want to learn to read for themselves with a view to becoming lifelong readers.

As a school, we teach what children need to make sense of and improve the world. It is our belief that children need powerful knowledge to understand and interpret the world. Our goal is for children to grow into useful citizens, with an understanding of the common good, who will shape the world together.

The curriculum is supported by the school's core values of respect, resilience, caring, co-operation, honesty and fairness which are explored through the curriculum and during collective worship.





### **Relationship and Sex Education**

All Relationship and Sex education is taught in the context of Christianity and is introduced through Health Education as part of the Science and PSHE curriculum. Some elements of the curriculum are taught separately within each year group.

Parents are advised that they have the right to withdraw their child from all or part of the Relationship and Sex education offered outside of the Science and PSHE curriculum. Please discuss this with the Headteacher in advance.



### **Home Learning**

At St Michael at Bowes we recognise the partnership between home and school is vital in helping each child reach their full potential. By providing home learning we hope to involve not just the child but the parents/carers as well. It becomes a shared experience and allows parents/carers to monitor their child's progress. We believe that it provides children with the opportunity to practice skills taught in class, develop independent learning skills and begin to recognise that learning takes place beyond the classroom.

We do not refer to 'homework' at St Michael at Bowes, but 'home learning'. We teach our children to enjoy and relish learning. The word "work" can turn children away from learning so we try not to use it. Much of the learning is challenging and the children will have to make a great deal of effort to achieve it, we teach them how to overcome challenges to become successful. Each term, year groups send home a curriculum letter, which informs parents/carers of the term's curriculum and gives advice on how you could support your child. It also provides details concerning home learning tasks.

### **Assessment**

Assessment is a continuous process, which is integral to all our teaching. We assess children, within lessons by providing high quality oral feedback and formal testing, in order to ascertain what they have learnt, so that we can plan the next stages of their development. Much of the assessment is based on the teacher's professional judgement of the child's achievements, using evidence from the child's work.

Your child will also participate in the following formalised assessments:

- Standard Assessment Tests in Year 6 to assess their progress at the end of Key Stage 2
- Published test materials in Years 3, 4 and 5 are used to inform teaching assessment and allow us to anticipate additional support for the following year
- In addition, further detailed assessments are made for children with special needs





Parents will be asked for voluntary contributions towards the cost of a school visit and will be advised of the amount needed to meet the cost of the trip. Whilst not contributing on a voluntary basis in no way diminishes the right of your child to take part in a school activity, insufficient contribution to cover the overall expenses of a trip, may result in cancellation. The financial situation of families is always considered and respected.

Parents will receive a letter well in advance of visits, giving details of the trip, its cost, and includes a parental permission slip which must be completed in order for the children to take part.



Behaviour Policy we have developed a framework to enable this to happen.

The school alone cannot instil a framework of discipline into children. It is therefore essential that parents work closely together with the school. Parents / carers and pupils all have a duty to play an active role in ensuring that the school maintains an atmosphere in which all feel proud of their work and conduct.

#### Through our Behaviour Policy we hope:

- To develop a positive atmosphere which is based on a sense of personal worth
- To provide a caring, friendly and safe environment where all pupils can learn in a relaxed and secure atmosphere
- To promote self-discipline, fostering self-respect, respect for others, and care for the school in the wider community and environment
- To provide a framework that recognises and supports the need for courteous and considerate behaviour from both children and adults
- To encourage the support and cooperation of parents / carers

# **Rights Respecting School Council**

We are very proud of our RRS Council and the important role it plays in the life and direction of the school.

Two elected members, who stand for one year, represent each of our classes. A member of staff chairs the RRS council. The meetings are minuted and the Senior Management Team of the school discusses the issues raised. Copies of the RRS Council minutes are displayed, along with photographs and information about each member and details of the council's activities.



## **Child Protection**

The school follows the Local Authority's child protection procedure. The procedures give clear instructions to all schools to immediately inform the Education Department and Social Services if there is an allegation of child abuse. It is the school's legal duty to follow these instructions. The parents of any child involved are, of course, informed as soon as possible thereafter. We have designated members of staff in the school responsible for Child Protection.



## **Welfare and Medicines in School**

We have staff who are qualified First Aiders who will attend to minor accidents. If your child is unwell or has an accident at school our designated first aider will contact you. Please inform us of any telephone number changes as well as a change of workplace. We will of course make sure that your child is well looked after, if for any reason you cannot get to school immediately.

Regular and punctual attendance is necessary if your child is to gain the full benefit from school. If your child is absent from school please telephone us as soon as possible especially if your child normally comes to school alone. On their return to school your child should provide a written explanation for the absence to their class teacher.

### **General Information**

#### **Mobile Phones**

We understand mobile phones are a part of 'everyday life' of children; but in general, children are not allowed to bring them onto the school premises or on trips.

Under exceptional circumstances permission may be granted. A parent/carer will need to put in writing, to the Headteacher, reasons why their child would need to bring a phone to school. Only brick/dumb phones may be allowed.

### **Working with parents/carers**

Parents are welcomed and valued in school. We recognise and value the huge contribution that parents make to the positive development of children. The Headteacher and the Deputy Headteacher are available to discuss any issue connected with your child or the school in general. Parents are always welcome to talk to class teachers, please arrange a mutually convenient time through the school office. Parent/teacher consultation evenings are held in the Autumn and Spring term. Written reports are sent home once a year.

We regard the help of parents in school as invaluable. If you have any time to spare and would like to join us to help in any way, please let your child's teacher know. There are also opportunities for parents to join celebrations and contribute to their child's learning within school time. Your interest in your child's education is greatly valued and we will ensure that you are kept well informed about the work done in school. Weekly newsletters are available on the school website, and at the beginning of each term, class teachers send an outline of the work they intend to cover using the Class Dojo.

### The Friends of Tottenhall Infants and St Michael at Bowes (FOTSA)

This is a joint Parents' Association with the Infant School next-door. All parents/carers are automatically members. We hope that you will be active members of The Friends and support as many events as possible.

#### **Maintenance Fund**

As a Voluntary Aided Church School, the Governors of the school are responsible for the maintenance of the buildings which can often be very expensive. We are charged PER CHILD and we do ask ALL parents to share in this responsibility by contributing £40 for FOR EACH AND EVERY ACADEMIC YEAR your child attends.

#### **The School Governors**

The governing board provides strategic leadership and accountability in schools. Our Governors take a positive and proactive role in ensuring that St Michael at Bowes School operates effectively, efficiently and happily. They work to balance the interests and needs of children, parents and staff.

# **Complaints**

We see the education of our children as a partnership between home and school. We are confident that most problems can be easily resolved. If you are concerned about any aspect of school life please contact, in the first instance, your child's class teacher who will hopefully resolve the matter for you.
